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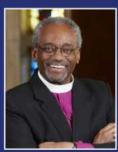

FROM THE EDITOR

"Good faith" is a flexible phrase with two (probably more) meanings, each of which depends on which word you stress.

There are some who take umbrage with the name "Good Faith Media," because it may imply that some individuals and media outlets (but not us) have

bad faith. This argument chooses to place the stress on the word "good." It assumes that whoever is uttering the phrase "good faith" walks around as jury and judge, deciding whose faith is good, whose is bad, and whose is just so-so.

Placing the stress on "faith," though, creates meaning that transcends both words in the phrase. In this way of speaking, good faith is about faith and goodness, but it is about something more. It evokes attitudes of openness, empathy, and trust.

Interestingly, "Good *faith*" often precedes the word "argument," which seems jarring. Is there anything good or faithful about arguments? For the conflict-averse among us, the answer may be a clear "absolutely not." But for others, arguments made in good faith are, by definition, good and faithful.

Perhaps it would be helpful to replace the word "argument" with the softer, more pillowy word "conversation?" (Don't think I didn't just see those of you who aren't conflict-averse rolling your eyes.)

People who participate in good faith con-versations assume the best about all parties involved. They listen and empathize. They are open to being moved, but are also honest about standing their ground when they believe it is necessary.

When I think about good faith conversations, the story from Acts 8 of Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch comes to mind. Those of us who have read the story since childhood know the ending – the eunuch comes to faith in Jesus. But I'm more drawn to the setup than I am the conclusion.

Both Philip and the eunuch are, in their own ways, outsiders. Philip is a secondary character in a cast of leading men and women. The eunuch is on the margins of society and gender norms. The scene occurs outside the institutional confines of Jerusalem. Philip leads with a question, "Do you know about what you're reading?" The eunuch replies with an invitation, "Why don't you come up into my chariot to talk about it?"

It's tempting to assume an attitude of coercion in Philip's approach. That may have existed, but it isn't in the text. If we grew up immersed in the Christian story, we also may assume a naivete in the eunuch that also isn't in the text.

What is in the story are two people having a good conversation – a good faith conversation.

I need you to know something here at the outset of *Good Faith Magazine*: In our current environment, good faith conversations are difficult for me. I don't think I'm alone. The fact that I write about faith doesn't help, because I am often tempted to place the stress on "good" when writing from my faith perspective, while silently judging the quality of the faith of others. I hope you take my confession as a good faith attempt to begin a conversation.

I also invite you receive what is contained within this publication in good faith. We are bearing witness to the things we have seen, heard, and experienced. You may agree and resonate with everything you read here, but I doubt it. In fact, disagreement may invite a spirit of good faith more easily than agreement. It encourages a spirit of curiosity and kindness, which, I believe, is very good. **GFM**
